

Hello Everyone!

I asked you last time to write a paragraph about the steps of creating a Facebook account. You are required to mention the steps in a logical order and to move smoothly to the next steps. If you mention the last step, you have to say "finally". One of you wrote the title "Make a Facebook Account". This structure means that you are recommending making a Facebook account, so in the paragraph, I am expecting you to give me the reasons why I should make a Facebook account.

Try to make your titles a little bit short. When using modals like "must, should, will, etc.", we do not use "to" after them. So, we say "I must do", not "I must to do". Pay attention to the use of the articles "a/an/the".

Do not say in the paragraph "I am going to explain the steps of making a Facebook account". As I said last time, if you begin with "firstly", then you continue "secondly, thirdly, fourthly, etc." However, if you begin with "first", then you continue "second, third, fourth, etc." You have to be consistent.

Of course, the word "Facebook" is one word, and it is written with a capital letter. When you write the steps, you should not number them as in a list since a paragraph has to be consistent.
